CATALOG DESCRIPTION: 7KV course**M** designed to develop familiarity with general musical concepts and styles from a broad spectrum of art, traditional, and popular musical perspectives, with a focus on fundamental knowledge for musicians including: 1) historical and cultural musical perspectives from European art and non-Western sources; 2) familiarity with musical terminology and analysis; 3) a broad understanding of European and non-Western musical instruments and vocal styles; 4) development of active listening and music-specific writing skills specifically aimed at music majors.

REQUIREMENTS: There is no required text for this course. All course materials including reading assignments, announcements, listening examples, weekly quizzes, major examinations, and study guides will be posted on the Canvas course site. Attendance points (.5 points at the beginning, and .5 points at the end) will be awarded on a per class basis. All email correspondence will be sent to students via their official FAU email address. Posted announcements from Canvas are automatically sent to each student as email. All students are responsible for regularly checking their email or the Announcements section in Canvas. EVALUATIONS: In addition to quizzes and attendance points, students will be evaluated on the combined scores from four non-comprehensive online exams. The exam format will consist of multiple choice, matching, true or false, and listening sections. See the Class Schedule below for exact exam dates and times. No make-up examinations or pre-examinations will be given without prior arrangement. The final grades will be based on an adjusted percentage curve, with the total possible points determined by the highest student score. After an adjustment in student's favor, grades will be distributed according to the following percentages:

ATTENDANCE POLICY STATEMENT:
